# From the President Spring 2024

# The downsizing process is a mourning process and cannot be done in one shot. Underneath it all, it really is an ongoing psychological battle.

lan and I are currently downsizing our lives. We are not retiring and hope we still have at least a few years before this becomes our reality. Nevertheless, as we took stock of our current circumstances and assessed our capacity to continue doing the things we do within the framework of our living arrangements, we came to the conclusion that, to best enable ourselves to continue in our ministries, some adjustments needed to be made. And so we are about to move out of the parish rectory, a large four bedroom, two bathroom, multiple living space home set on a large block with a sizeable garden and outdoor living areas. We are moving into a modest home in a lifestyle village with no garden to speak of; with just enough room for the cactuses and succulents that will come in their pots, and a spot for Dusty, the dog.

The first step has been to declutter. I started with that which was easy for me, going room to room, cupboard to cupboard, deciding what to let go off, what to give away, what to send to the Op Shop and what to set aside for the upcoming parish fete. Going through the office, emptying the filing cabinet (which is not making the move), much has gone through the paper shredder. The display cabinets have proven more challenging. We have four and only two will be coming with us. The first sweep was easy, there was much of no real sentimental value that we never use and never pay any mind to. The second sweep took more effort as harder decisions had to be made. It is an evolving process as we determine what really is important to us. Needless to say, the last room to get my attention is my sewing and craft room. I am not ready yet to face that challenge!

Mothers Union too is facing challenges, needing to take stock of its current circumstances and assess its capacity to continue doing the things it has being doing within the framework of the environment in which it currently operates. On an international level this has included an assessment over the past few years of the viability of the model of operation that existed prior to the outbreak of the Covid pandemic at the start of 2020. Many changes have already been made and more are to come. Mary Sumner House, which became a major conference centre when its rooms were renovated a number of years ago following the closure of its accommodation facilities, no longer generates income from bookings of the magnitude needed to maintain such a major building and meet the operational costs of

Mothers Union. Adjustments will need to be made if Mothers Union is to continue its ministries.

It will not be without pain; hard decisions will have to be made as to what to let go and what to hold on to. Nationally, we have recently adopted a revised AMUA Handbook. Part of the rationale was the need to declutter the document, to remove unnecessary and, in a few cases, redundant content, and to rearrange what was left into a more user-friendly format. Another reason for the revision was the recognition that we needed to adjust the expectations on branches and dioceses with regard to their formal structures and the methods of operation needed to respond to the realities of our circumstance. What is most important is that, as we provide the opportunity for a downsizing in these areas, we maintain an environment where the ministries of Mothers Union have the capacity to continue to flourish, where we have the capacity to continue to live out our vision and our objectives, where we continue to walk in Mary Sumner's footsteps and to uphold our calling to prayer and action.

Father Nick also spoke positively on the MU branch in Busselton being an integral part of St. Mary's church. Father Nick celebrated the Eucharist for us and following it, all were welcomed to share fellowship in St. Mary's Family Centre.In July we also welcomed Liz Byleveld and were fascinated by what she had to tell us about her time in Kapsabet. She is a wonderful young woman and we are sure that God will bless her in her next adventure of faith.

# Friendship Day 2024



For the past four years the Diocese of Bunbury has been holding Friendship Days for members. Held in a different parish each year, and not necessarily one where there is a Mothers Union branch, our Friendship Days are designed to be interactive workshops. We deliberately meet outside our major coastal population centres, choosing instead to travel to small worshipping communities.

This year we came together to Explore God Through Technology. Rev'd Justine Richmond, former teacher and school chaplain and now a parish priest, has worked with children for over 17 years. Using the knowledge and experience gained, she responded to questions from a baptism family, and the desire of parishioners wanting to share their faith with grandchildren and children who are disconnected from church and God to develop her presentation.

Apart from three people, Rev'd Justine, our diocesan president, and our chaplain, all those present were over 70 years of age, with several in their 80's. Age was no barrier to downloading and learning to use apps on mobile phones and tablets, some child focused to be used with our grandchildren and others for our own use.

Rev'd Justine cautioned us to not share anything with children or teenagers that we hadn't watched or read ourselves and to be mindful of crossing lines that parents might object to, to be inclusive with books, and be attentive to the theology presented in what we are sharing, especially if the family are not currently church goers. We were also encouraged to take an interactive approach to sharing with our grandchildren, to let them tell us things that comes to their minds and to encourage thinking by using 'I wonder' questions.

Members enjoyed watching some of the YouTube Christian based videos that are out there, such as the Cheeky Pandas and even got into one of the songs with actions. We also watched a trailer for 'The Chosen', which none of the members present had seen, but which is gaining in popularity as an accessible expression of the New Testament.

Rev'd Justine suggested that the use of technology should not ever replace quality time, but rather we can use it to enhance our sharing time with our grandchildren and allow us to live a little in their world while also inviting them to experience a little of our faith world. She also brought along some books that she recommends for using with children and young people – she even read a couple of the picture books to us. Having the books as a part of our workshop gave those that are super technologically challenged another option.

Following the overwhelming positive response to Rev'd Justine's presentation we are now planning to have her visit several parishes around the diocese, where Mothers Union branches will host a workshop open to all. *Wendy Mabey*

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# From the archives - September 24th 1964. 60 years ago!

(Thank you Diocesan President Wendy, for this article)

Below is an excerpt from a branch minutes book:

Inaugural meeting held in C.W.A. rooms at 8.30pm on Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> September [1964] following the MU service in [the] church for admission of official workers.....

The meeting was officially opened by Mrs F..., and the 3 objects of Mothers Union were said by all present...

#### Correspondence:

- 1) A telegram from the President & executive of Mothers Union with best wishes for our first meeting
- 2) A circular regarding the Diocesan Festival at which the Commonwealth President Mrs T Reid will be present
- 3) The Diocesan constitution has been received and discussed...

Mrs H..., our presiding member spoke about the Bunbury Diocese in comparison to the Perth Diocese...

Also Mrs H... mentioned several ways by which MU may help the church:-

- 1) Mid well communions
- 2) Corporate communions
- 3) Prayer groups...
- 4) Cradle Roll
- 5) Hospital visiting and a small gift for new born babies was also discussed...

This branch lasted for all of 8 years and its minutes speak of small numbers, lack of interest, lack of contact from diocesan executive, and lack of support for small & struggling branches.

Unfortunately, this has been the tale of many of our inland branches.

Here are the places where, according to our financial records, we had branches in 1948/49 (listed as they appeared in the ledger:

There were at this time also several Young Wives groups mentioned in the ledger. More next time!

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#### SOCIAL ISSUES AND ACTION REPORT

I heard some good news just recently, the State Government has given a \$350 grant to households for their Power bills throughout the State. This is really helpful even us as pensioners have benefited and as our power bill was much more than normal due to adult grandchildren staying in our Studio Unit hence a larger bill! Some further good news is that here in Katanning there are some new houses that have been built as well as the demountable units, it may take some pressure off.

World peace seems further away due to problems getting Israel & Hamas to come to a peace deal to stop the war there. In Ukraine the invasion by Russia has continued but Ukraine seems to be trying to create a buffer zone between them and Russia invading Russian territory in that area. We can only pray that things will change and agreements reached.

In some parts of Africa where there has been issues with countries such as Sudan and Kenya the Mothers Union has been at work also. The visit by Liz Byleveld gave us some interesting insights into what help MU can be in Kapsabet, for instance.

Our local Katanning Regional Emergency Relief Centre has had many calls on their services, but the Department of Communities has held Workshops in Katanning on 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> August, re a new women's refuge at KREAC a new homelessness response and importantly a new men's behaviour change program

The climate change issue does not escape our attention with huge fires in Canada and Greece very difficult for the people of the villages and towns affected by this.

We have many tings to be thankful for and the help given by Boniface Care to the church in towns such as Katanning and Kojonup where we are able to assist the schools with uniforms for the children whose parents find themselves unable to do so . May we always be praying for those in need and give thanks for the blessings we have in our lives

# Here's some fun! - Travelling to Heaven - Essential information

ACCOMMODATION - arrangements for first class accommodation have been made in advance (John 14:2)

PASSPORTS, VISAS etc - persons seeking entry will not be permitted past the gates without the proper credentials, and their names registered with the Authority of their country of destination (Revelation 21:27)

DEPARTING TIMES - the exact date of departure has not been announced. Travellers are advised to be prepared to leave at short notice (Acts 1:7)

TICKETS - take the form of a written pledge that guarantees your journey. It needs to be claimed and Its promises kept firmly in hand. (John 5: 24)

CUSTOMS - only one declaration is required through customs. (1 Corinthians 15: 1,3&4 IMMIGRATION: - travellers are classified as immigrants since they are taking up permanent residence in the new country. There is no quota limit (Hebrews 11:16)

LUGGAGE: - no luggage whatsoever can be taken, nor is it required. Full provision is made on arrival. (1Timothy 6: 7 Isaiah 61:10)

AIR TRAVEL: - those going directly by air are advised to watch daily for indications of imminent departure. (1Thessalonians 4: 17)

VACCINATIONS, INOCULATIONS, MEDICAL PRECAUTIONS: - not needed at all; diseases are unknown in the country of destination. (Revelation 21:4)

CURRENCY: - arrangements should be made to liquefy all assets and forward them ahead to await arrival (Matthew 6:20)

PLACE RESERVATIONS: - bookings are now open. Application should be made immediately (2 Corinthians 6: 2)

CORONATION CEREMONY: - the climax of the journey is the welcoming reception and coronation that greets each arrival. (2 Timothy 4: 8)

Please take action as required on the various points given above.
