"-I think we all use Christmas cards as an excuse for the lack of loving concern and friendship over the year. We feel guilty about someone not contacted for a whole year, so we sign our name on a Christmas card and send it off, hoping perhaps in this was to write off our responsibility."

While this is not true of everybody, or every card we send, it perhaps points to something that we could do as individuals or as a branch; contact people who we haven't seen around for a while. They may be confined to the house, or in a nursing home. Or we could try partnering with an overseas branch, or possibly a lone member in another state.

Mother Teresa said "We can do no great things, only small things with great love". This is so important to remember when we feel daunted or inadequate.

God is not calling us to save the world on our own, but together we <u>can</u> do small things with great love. And that can make a lot of difference!

# "Advent: the time to listen for footsteps – you can't hear footsteps when you're running yourself." Bill McKibben

Three months ago, as I wrote for our Spring magazine, I reflected on the challenge of downsizing, the need to take stock and to make decisions on what is important, what to keep and what to let go.

As I sit in my office/sewing alcove, I am surrounded by what is important, for now. I have my computer system, an essential tool in managing our personal affairs and in carrying out the roles I have undertaken in Mothers Union and beyond. From time to time the desk gets a little messy with piles of receipts to process and file, and notes of things to do strewn around.

The cork noticeboard holds varying contact details for people written on small pieces of paper, accounts awaiting payment, and an assortment of inspirational messages such as 'Keep calm and sail on'! A Cursillo card asks 'What Christian gifts have I used in His service?' and the Rotary "Four Way Test of things we think, say and do, asks 'Is it the TRUTH? Is it FAIR? Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS? Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?'

Leaning against the cork board is a 1997 calendar, waiting for 1st January 2025 when the days and dates will be in perfect sync and I can use it once again. Just to the side of the board is my 1985 Young Citizen of the Year Award, reminding me of my life long commitment to community through servant leadership.

Sitting on a shelf above is my display of animal ornaments, mostly collected on overseas holidays. Some are gifts and some are personal indulgences. Each has a story and each has a reason that it became and remains a part of my collection.

If I turn my chair 90 degrees to the right, I find myself facing my sewing table. This represents my personal time, my relaxation, my time to inwardly nurture myself.

Above the sewing table is a haphazard collection of memorabilia – a picture given to me when I was a young child, some bark pictures created by my mother and myself during my guiding years, a fluffy dog given to me by Ian shortly before we married, some photos of my children when they were young, a clock that belonged to Ian's aunt, a number of ladybird ornaments (I have always liked ladybirds), and a canvas painting created by my oldest grandson when he was a toddler.

The rest of the wall and floor space in the alcove is taken up with shelves and cupboards that support my administrative and sewing activities.

Do I need everything that I have in my little alcove? Probably not! However, I have managed to find a place for it all and, if not altogether useful, many of these things have remained with me because they bring me joy; they call to mind memories and experiences, they remind me of people who have been a part of my life.

As we move through this summer season, amidst the busyness of end of year parties, Christmas and New Year preparations, I pray that we may all find time to inwardly nurture ourselves, to find joy in the things that surround us and to, above all else, truly embrace Christ in our lives as we once again celebrate his birth. # A Christmas message from our Chaplain, the Rev'd Cathie Broome



'I was thinking that this might be useful for those who are at home or unable to get to church, as well as all of us as we prepare for Christmas.'

Greetings my MU brothers and sisters in Christ,

It's hard to believe, but another year draws to an end, both on the calendar and in the Church year as we turn our lectionaries to Year C. All around us we see signs that Christmas is coming, but as I walked around the shops the other day, I pondered the absence of Jesus among much of the preparations. So this year I thought my final message for 2024 would be an opportunity to prepare our hearts for Christmas.

This season is truly sacred, as we set aside time to remember and prepare our hearts for the birth of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. Whether your home is adorned with decorations and you've got Christmas carols playing all day long, or you're still struggling to get into the spirit of the holiday, God's word can help us focus on Jesus and remind us what this season is all about.

Our preparation starts with the need for a Saviour. Long before Jesus' birth, the story of redemption was unfolding as His coming was prophesied and God's people were waiting for Him. He was the perfect king who would be just, righteous and mighty.

**Jeremiah 23:5** - The Lord says, "The time is coming when I will choose as king a righteous descendant of David. That king will rule wisely and do what is right and just throughout the land."

**Isaiah 7:14** -But the Lord will still give you proof. A virgin is pregnant; she will have a son and will name him Immanuel.

Today, these passages remind us of God's love for us. He knew the need of a broken, fallen people to be saved. Through His great love and compassion, God set into motion the perfect plan to save the world by sending His Son.

Then we enter into a time of Anticipation. We can only imagine what Joseph and Mary experienced as they were told of the miraculous conception and the upcoming birth of the precious baby boy who would save the world. Feelings of honour, anticipation, fear, joy and so much more. The time leading to Jesus' birth was certainly eventful and exciting, a time like no other.

**Matthew 1:20-23** - An angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").

**Luke 1:26-28** - In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favoured. The Lord is with you."

Today, we can read these verses with the knowledge of who Jesus is and all that He did during His life on earth. We find ourselves humbled to be on this side of His life, death and resurrection.

And we continue with cause for Celebration. These verses are a vivid depiction; for the birth of Jesus caused the angels to praise and worship. The angels came and shared the greatest news ever that Jesus was born.

**Luke 2:6-7** - While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

**Luke 2:13-15** - Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying,

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests." When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

Today, these passages draw us into praise and worship too, as we celebrate and anticipate Christmas. The birth that changed every life and the world is certainly worthy of all the glory, praise and honour it received — then and now.

The good news is that the Nativity, Jesus' miraculous birth, was just the beginning. The beginning of Jesus' ministry was radical. John the Baptist prepared the way and the Spirit of God announced who Jesus was. Jesus began His earthly ministry by calling us all to turn from our sin and have faith in Him.

**John 1:14** - The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Mark 1:10 - Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

At Christmas, we celebrate His humble birth that leaves us with a lasting peace and hope because Jesus has come, He conquered death, and we can put our faith and hope fully in Him.

As I write this report. I heard some more news today regarding the building of new homes throughout Australia. The Government is to encourage the use of demountable type homes the kind that are made in a factory then assembled on site. I think this is very positive as we seemingly do not have enough building companies to build the number of homes required to be built in brick.

From the Editor - The following is good news from Busselton - 'The proposed four-storey development on Brown Street, Busselton, which received a major boost in the 2024-25 State Budget, will offer a mix of 16 social and 14 affordable housing options located close to the CBD and local services.'

The conflict between Israel and Palestine and now Lebanon continues with Saudi Arabia now indicating they are having no success in trying to get negotiations going with Israel and Palestine and not willing to continue. We need to pray that another avenue will be found to bring the warring parties together to negotiate a peace plan.

The war in Ukraine continues. This is very sad and devastating for the people of Ukraine, and further to my last letter it seems that North Korea has sent troops to help Russia. Apparently Russia has lost many troops in this conflict. Now that we will have President Trump in place in America from 20th January next year one wonders if he can achieve peace so that Ukraine keeps its territory.

We need also to pray for the families of young people killed in car crashes on our roads. It seems we hear of another tragic accident every week. Better driver training would be a good way to go. Some good news about the young and education I have heard about is the sessions in schools teaching young people about the dangers of vapes, a trial has proved to be effective I believe.

We pray for our farmers and their workers as they begin the harvest this year. May they have a good return on their crops .

Amidst the bad news we hear of good things happening and our care agencies such as Anglicare, Mission Australia and Caritas provide counsellors and emergency relief. In our Diocese we are thankful for Boniface Care; through this here in Katanning we provide money for school uniforms, and help to the pharmacy with the cost of scripts so people can get their medicine when needed.

We lift our prayers to God in thankfulness and hope for the future. Our MU Theme song for 2025 for our Diocese is: "God Gives us a Future". May we take the words of this beautiful hymn to heart.
