Miraculous Answer to Prayer

and Jill Faed Struan are members of St **Nicholas** Church, Australind, In April. adult daughter Abbey Spinelli was flown to Fiona Stanley Hospital in a critically unwell state after suffering lifethreatening cardiogenic shock brought on by coronavirus complications. Abbey remained in a critical condition on ECMO life support for six days, during which time the medical staff her family for prepared of high-risk number complications. Through massive prayer chain of family, friends and church congregations, across Australia and around the world lifted her up in prayer. From being the most critically unwell patient in ICU, Abbey's condition began to improve, with a miraculous recovery of her diseased heart. Abbey says,

"I want to share my absolute thankfulness and praise God's protection and miracle of healing. The medical staff prepared my family that complications with my other organs and limbs were a risk if I was on the life support machine for longer than three days, but I came off it after six days with none of those complications having happened. The doctors also said that for every day I was in the coma would require a week of recovery in hospital afterwards - instead I spent one week recovering in ICU and cardiology after being in the coma for six days. ICU specialists, doctors and nurses told me how incredible the

recovery of my condition and heart was, given how critically unwell I'd been from the cardiogenic shock. What a powerful witness for the medical staff who said to me "Someone was looking out for you!" Our hearts are filled with praise. We will forever be thankful for the army of God's people who raised their voices in prayer to the Almighty One who saved my life."

However important and worthwhile our Diocesan Vision and Strategies may be, they are always at risk of being swamped by everyday pressures and the force of what we normally do. To change this requires conscious effort and commitment. Maybe that is why Paul wrote in Thessalonians we "should pray without ceasing".

Prayer Walking in Harvey and Donnybrook

Rev Cathie Broome has introduced prayer walking after Sunday morning services in her parishes in Harvey and Donnybrook.

Church members encouraged to pray quietly for their local community and for people they see on the streets as they walk through the who parish. Those are unable to walk can use mobility vehicles or their cars. Having received peace from God and fellowship with one another, it seems particularly fitting to be immediately sent out into the community to pray. Those who are unable to join in the prayer walk are encouraged to pray as they drive home.



Harvey Parish have already seen some fruit from their prayers: the Shire of Harvey approached the church for help to run a youth club for all the local youth. Planning for this is in the early stages and funding is pending. It is exciting to see bridges being made into the community and all starting with prayer. The next prayer walks in Harvey will take place on Pentecost Sunday and Trinity Sunday and in Donnybrook on Trinity Sunday.

Prayer Ministry in Australind



Prayer Ministry is now being offered after morning services at St Nics in Australind. Prayer Ministry differs intercession as it offers an opportunity to connect with the the transforming power and presence of God. Each time of prayer begins by inviting the Holy Spirit to come. People come for prayer ministry for a wide range of reasons - for example, some are seeking peace, others healing, others a fresh infilling of the Holy Spirit . Rev Jamie and Verity Murray ran a Prayer Ministry Training Course for those who wish to take part. St Nics now has a team of about 10 trained people who are able to offer this ministry after the services. Since the team was launched in March people have come forward each week to receive prayer and the team are growing in confidence as they minister.

Suzanne Saunders, one of the team members says, "It is such a privilege to minister to people who come for prayer, sharing their vulnerability and seeking the Lord. It is humbling and inspiring to see the Holy Spirit come and work in them. I am thankful to be involved in this way of serving."

Praying for Ukraine in Secret Harbour

Rev Paul Watson ofSecret Harbour Anglican Church says, "As a church, we are keen to see the Diocesan Vision become a reality in our lives. We embraced the first strategy – deepening and growing our prayerfulness – with enthusiasm. The other three strategies need the foundation of individual and corporate

As well as completing the Deeper Prayer study notes, we have also been stimulated to build into our calendar this year several prayer and fasting days, particularly leading up to significant mission events, such as our first Alpha course".

Deeper Prayer Feedback

At least 8 parishes in the diocese have used the Deeper Prayer study notes so far as part of their strategy to deepen and grow prayer. Australind, Secret Harbour, Oyster Harbour, Gelorup and Southern Forests parishes also explored the themes of prayer Thessalonians in a sermon series. Rev Karen Cave at Albany parish referred to the study as part of her daily morning prayer livestream and posed the questions rather than giving answers. The studies in each parish were done in a variety of ways - in face to face small groups, online groups and by individuals. In Albany the Mothers Union, Ladies Guild and Ladies Fellowship were all encouraged to take part too. Feedback so far has been very positive. Here are a selection of comments received about the course:

"It is evident to me that our congregation have advanced their spiritual strength and faith through this course and pushed the horizons of their faith . . . and love is developing between the members, as described in Thessalonians" (Brian Seale, Narrogin)

The wonderful thing about doing this study was that it opened so many prayer 'options' and gave suggestions. We all agreed that we tend to get stuck in a rut in our prayer life, and this study was creative and invigorating." (Andrea Nicholson, Oyster Harbour)

"The study has resulted in long lasting benefits. For some it has meant a new discipline in prayer, but for all of us an enrichment of our existing prayer life". (Andrea Nicholson, Oyster Harbour)

"It was like mining fresh treasures each week. Several of our members commented on how they had put into practice what they learned and were seeing God at work in ways that were very tangible, and often unexpected" (Rev Paul Watson, Secret Harbour).

Verity Murray from Australind parish has written a prayer based on St Paul's prayers for the Thessalonians. A copy of it is on page 6.

Growing in Gratitude

A common theme in the Deeper Prayer feedback has been a growth in praying with thanks. Andrea Nicholson from Oyster Harbour parish explains:

"Week 2 study was Pray with Thanks. We had never thought of thanking God for a person's gifts, character and other attributes as we intercede. It was exciting to be taken through the biblical basis for this, and have a new facet added to our prayer life".

Rev Paul Bartley from Gateway Parish comments:

"I was definitely spurred on in thanksgiving and prayer for the Christians I chose to focus on, my mentors over the years."

A new initiative at Living Waters Church (Oyster Harbour Parish) is the creation of a monthly gratitude journal by the pastoral care team for congregation members to record their prayers of thanks each day. The journal is designed to help members to be intentional about being thankful and to discover an ever deepening joy in God.



A Prayer for the Diocese of Bunbury based on 1 and 2 Thessalonians

The prayer below was written by Verity Murray, of St Nicholas Church, Australind, after completing the Deeper Prayer Study notes. It is based on the prayers written by St Paul in his letters to the Thessalonians. You may like to use this prayer for your own group, parish or organisation, or for individual Christians you may know. Simply replace the words underlied in the first sentence with your own words.

Dear Father, thank you for each person in <u>the Diocese of Bunbury.</u> Thank you that we have received your word and that your word is at work in each one of us. Thank you for the faith and love we share. Thank you for those who serve sacrificially on our behalf and for all who lead by example with endurance and perseverance.

Father, I pray that you will count each one of us worthy of your calling. I ask that by your power you will fulfil our every good purpose and every action that is sparked by faith. May you be glorified in us and may we be glorified in you. May you provide anything that is lacking in us so that we may grow in maturity in faith.

Please direct our hearts more and more into your love so that, as we receive your love, our love for others will overflow. May we encourage each other and build one another up. May we honour those in authority and live at peace with one another.

I pray that you will sanctify us through and through and that we will be ready and waiting for Jesus' return. Please strengthen our hearts and direct them into Christ's peace and perseverance so that we may overcome everything that opposes our faith or tempts us away from you.

May we live lives that bring honour to you and win the respect of those who are not yet Christians. May the gospel message ring out clearly from each one of us and draw others to faith and relationship with you.

Thank you that you are faithful and you will do it.
