

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Four Strategies, One Vision

Our vision - Being God's Church in God's World through fulfilling the two great Commandments: to love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, and our neighbour (anyone we encounter who is in need) as ourselves - is broken down into the four strategies outlined opposite.

Each parish, Anglican Community and organisation in our diocese can tackle each of the strategies in the way that best suits them. As you can see from this and previous editions of the Vision and Strategy newsletters, there is a great variety of ways in which we are fulfilling God's two great commandments. It is inspiring and encouraging to read about these and hopefully we are learning from each other.

Its important to remember that as we move onto a new strategy we don't leave a previous strategy behind. Instead we aim to build on each strategy. Our deeper prayer lives and our learning more about Christ will lead us to love one another and be salt and light in our communities. And as we do this, we continue to pray and 'Learn Christ'.

Although we are just about to introduce the 3rd Strategy - *Growing in love for, and encouragement of, one another* - we will continue to report on what's happening with regard to the first two strategies. To make it easier to see which strategies are being discussed we use the strategy colour codes in the headings of our articles: green for 'Deeper Prayer, blue for 'Learn Christ, purple for 'Love one Another' and pink for 'Being Salt and Light'.

Interview with Bishop Ian

Our current vision and strategy runs from 2021-2025. We are now at the half way mark! We thought this would be a good time to ask Bishop lan for his thoughts on how he sees the vision being fulfilled.

Bishop lan, what do you think is going well with the Vision and Strategy so far?

I am really happy with the variety of resources we have been able to produce or recommend to support the vision and strategy. With Learning More about Jesus Christ, for instance, we prepared a Resources Brochure last August and have since reported on how you have been making use of those resources, as well as introducing further resources in successive editions of this Newsletter.

We have surveyed our parishes and organisations about what they have been doina with the Vision regards and Strategies. We received 20 replies for Deepening our Prayerfulness and 13 replies for Learning More about Jesus Christ. That is out of around 40 parishes, Anglican communities and organisations in our diocese. It is possible that not everyone who participated has replied, and it is also possible we are not quite reaching everyone with this information.

To have half to one third of the diocese engaged with one or more of the strategies is really encouraging.

Is there anything else you would like to see happening?

It would be wonderful if we could have feedback from all 40 of our parishes. communities and organisations! I am sure more is happening than we know about, but we only know if someone tells us what's going on in their 'neck of the woods'. Any news related to the V&S, no matter how small. or seemingly insignificant. is always encouraging to receive.





Interview with Bishop Ian continued



Someone has commented that whilst the strategies may be worthwhile, getting people to engage enthusiastically may prove difficult when we often have so many other things going on in our lives. This is a really significant challenge - one that Jesus himself encountered in his earthly ministry.

Time and time again Jesus encouraged his disciples and followers to prioritise the kingdom of God over their day to day responsibilities, interests and cares. Our Vision to be God's church in God's world may require us to change what we do and how we are. Michael Frost, in his book Surprise the World, suggests it involves altering habits. This is not something we find easy to do and it requires practice.



Of course, using resources Deepening on Prayerfulness, or Learning more about Jesus Christ, can be a source of inspiration and encouragement but may not be the same as actually deepening our prayer becoming Christlike. more which is the real aim.

What's happening next with the Vision and Strategies?

We had a discussion about this at our Clergy Conference May. Our clergy have suggested that whilst some may be ready to move to the Love next strategy, One Another. we should also continue to re-visit Deepening Prayerfulness our Learning More about Jesus Christ. because of the importance of these strategies in being God's church in God's world.

Some may wish to try resources they may not have had the opportunity to use as yet or might wish to have a go at one of these resources if they have not done so at all. All of these resources are available or listed on our website under Vision and Strategy. For anyone not yet involved its not too late to get started. Why not look at the website and find a resource to suit you?





Seek First the Kingdom



Report by Rev Karen Cave, St John's Albany

During Lent at St John's we had a series of studies on 'Seek First the Kingdom' in the Gospel of Matthew. We looked at Matthew as a guide for Christians in living fearlessly into the ways of Jesus Christ. The Kingdom of Heaven is the vision that anchors this teaching. We considered through the words of The Lord's Prayer that the ethics of the Kingdom require wholehearted dedication and courage to not just go along with generally-held values. There is a need to make God's Kingdom the absolute foundation for following Jesus.

We learnt that Jesus was God's ultimate teacher and model to follow in living daily life and explored the importance of seeking heavenly reward rather than earthly gain. This led us to become a group of discerning navigators, discussing with one another, and deciding as a community, which of the twists and turns to take in the road that leads to life. Part of the journey was to reflect on the parables only found in Matthew then how, as a nation, we live in a society based on individuality.

Finally we all have been entrusted to proclaim the nearness of God's Kingdom and to help bring God's peace to a broken and divided world.

Both group studies enjoyed the reflection and discussions that these studies encouraged, and they deepened our understanding of the Kingdom of God.

Imaginary Doorway

This study by ABM was undertaken by at least three parishes in the diocese. Here are a selection of comments from some who took part.

"As stated in the introduction these stories take us on an Imaginative journey into the lives of some of the people Jesus encountered. The stories may sometimes be confusing alongside traditional scripture readings but have provided some lively discussions at our meetings and encouraged us to be grateful for Jesus' life of love, forgiveness and inclusion." "Study 1 was called 'Legion'. It was about the Gerasene Demoniac. Because of their fear of Legion his community made him an outcast and he was chained, persecuted and they forced him to live in isolation. Yet I believe Jesus came specifically to save him and set him free so that, through him, people might find forgiveness and compassion in their hearts. Because of his own suffering, Legion would have made a great missionary and I have no doubt he brought many people into the faith. This study has made me more think deeply about how I respond to people who are 'difficult', to try to be more compassionate and less judgemental when their

actions offend me."

"The imaginary retelling of the gospel story met with a mixed reception, but the discussions were all very good, although often touched on difficult subjects. It certainly opened our eyes to how Jesus interacted with people, particularly people most of the society of the day ... and our day! ... would 'write off'."

Alpha All over Albany . . .

The city of Albany have joined forces to present the Alpha Course in every church in the area in 2023! The idea for multiple Alpha courses running concurrently as a good way of improving evangelism and a show of unity was raised at the Albany Church Leaders' Fellowship. This fellowship is made up of church leaders who meet weekly for prayer and monthly as a committee.

All member churches have signed up to run Alpha after Easter. If one looks on line at the Alpha website, the map of Albany looks amazing! We have contributed towards a huge advert on the side of a popular cafe. We have held weekly combined church prayer meetings at 6am on Tuesdays to pray for the City and Alpha - around 60 people have come each week. The Alpha initiative is going well so far with ACLF member churches reporting enthusiastically. Living Waters Anglican Church in Oyster Harbour has Alpha running now and our St John's Alpha will begin in August. *Rev Karen Cave, St John's Albany*

The course comprises watching a 30 minute video followed by an open discussion and Q&A time. Each week covers a different aspect of the Christian faith, including:

- · Why did Jesus Die?
- · How can we have faith?
- Why and how do I pray?
- Why and how should I read the Bible?
- · Who is the Holy Spirit?

Whether you'd like to do Alpha for for the first time or the umpteenth time, there is aways something new and fresh to be gained from Alpha - not least meeting some new people and making some new friends. Now is the time to get involved! The course starts on Tuesday 20th July 2023 at 7pm. There is no pressure to attend every session - but its worth trying one session to get a taste for it and see if its for you.

Essie's Story



This story was written especially for the Vision and Strategy newsletter by Essie Kenworthy, from Busselton. standing member of the Mother's Union. Essie recounts how she received deep and lasting love and friendship from her MU friends over many years. Sadly, Essie passed away in May at the age of 97. Essie's Mother's Union scarf, badge and prayer book were presented at her funeral, along with the Christian symbols of a candle, water, the Scriptures and a cross. Essie was an honorary Life Member of MU Busselton and was awarded her badge for 60 years of service. Her funeral ended with a guard of honour by Essie's Mother's Union friends.

"My introduction to Mother's Union started in 1954 when Rev Tassell, who was a long time family friend and attached to the Bunbury Office, invited me to hep him start a YMD group in Busselton.

The initials stand for Young Members Department and was later renamed 'Caritas'.

At the time I was a widow with two small sons and a farm to run and I was a very sad person. We had a great group of young women who built up my enthusiasm for living again. They were so loving and caring to me and my sons.

After six years I remarried and moved to the city where I joined a YMD group and was made most welcome. I eventually was admitted to Mother's Union in 1961 and have found that over the years my closest friends have been MU members. I have been privileged to have as house guests MU members from England, Africa and the Eastern States and visited members in England and New Zealand. I have learned so much about other countries and people. I belong to several organisations but there is not that lovely bond of friendship in those groups.

Now once again being a widower for 15 years I thank God for being blessed with two beautiful husbands. My friends are nearly all MU members but at 97 I find that they are now getting old too. I am truly blessed to have been involved with Mother's Union for so long."
