Our Vision

Being the people God is calling us to be through fulfilling the two great Commandments: to love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, and our neighbour (anyone we encounter who is in need) as ourselves.

How are we going with living out this vision for 2021-2025? The vision is broken down into the four strategies (see the boxes opposite) and most of us are now well underway with the second strategy: Learning more about Jesus Christ in order to become more like Christ. If you haven't started yet, or still have some way to go, don't panic! We'll keep this focus going until at least Pentecost. There's more food for thought and inspiration for this strategy inside.

Filling your mind with the wonder of God





Multi-faceted Learning in Gateway Parish, Williams

We have a number of initiatives going on at Gateway Parish towards the 'Learn Christ' strategy. We are following a Sunday sermon series on Jesus' teachings in the Sermon on the Mount and during Lent a WhatsApp study group is also exploring this theme, using a study guide called, "Reading the Sermon on the Mount with John Stott."

A new mid-week Bible study group for our 4 or 5 highschoolers has recently started. Their focus is Paul's letter to the Philippians and the theme, "Have the Mindset of Christ".

We'll also have a topical sermon on healing and the healing miracles of Christ later in the year.

I am hoping to persuade our local repertory society to do a dramatised gospel reading on Good Friday of Palm Sunday.

Our hope is that we will know Christ in his teaching, his power, his miracles, his grace, his Lordship, his kindness . . . for every age and type of person to know him better.

A Word from Bishop Ian

Michael Frost's little but powerful book, 'Surprise the World: The Five Habits of Highly Missional People', uses an acronym *BELLS: Bless, Eat, Listen, Learn and Send.* The fourth of these habits - *Learn* - was the inspiration for our current 2nd Strategy of "Learning More about Jesus Christ in order to be like Christ".


Michael advocates devoting one period each week to learn more about Christ, for two reasons. First, "*the devotional value of growing closer to Jesus Christ*, fostering intimacy with God, hearing the promptings of the Spirit, and sensing his presence through the beauty of the Word in your life."

Second, "we need to know him if we are going to share him as the reason for the hope we have as Christians." You will recall 1 Peter 3.15: "Be always ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope."

Indeed, Michael Frost talks about *living "questionable lives"* – not questionable as in dodgy, but questionable as in causing others to ask us such questions. In a sequel book, 'Keep Christianity Weird', Michael Frost notes just how questionable Jesus' ministry and life was, and invites us to follow in these unorthodox and amazing footsteps.

I encourage you, as you read this Newsletter, to see if there are any resources here, or on our website, you have not yet explored that might help you in this significant endeavour. Michael Frost also suggests one direct route is to read the gospel of Mark.

New Diocesan Resource



Jesus on Jesus Study Notes

This six week study focuses on the seven 'I am' statements of Jesus in the Gospel of John. It helps us to explore the question:, 'Who is Jesus?', by seeking to understand Jesus' claims about himself. Each of the 'I am' statements, such as, "I am the Light of the World", are not only rich in meaning but also point back to Old Testament prophecies. The picture language Jesus used is vivid and His memorable. statements are also challenging and unequivocal. What do these statements mean for us today as followers of Jesus?

The study notes, written by Verity Murray from St Nicholas Church, Australind, can be used by individuals or small groups. The notes were written to accompany a sermon series on the 'I am' statements of Jesus last November. You can listen to the sermons via the St Nic's website:

Zoom ALPHA Update

- Who is the Holy Spirit?
- · How can I be filled with the Holy Spirit?

Education for Ministry



Interested in going deeper? You may like to consider the Education for Ministry program operating from Christ's Church Mandurah. EfM Australia is a four-year study and group reflection process for the formation of Christian ministry through the development of knowledge, attitude, skill, and identity as Christians.

Participants enrol in EfM one year at a time, undertaking 35 weeks of study, followed by a final week of celebration, usually with several breaks throughout the year. During the year, group members undertake study relevant to their year level and participate in whole group sharing and learning. There are no essays or exams. Participants keep a journal to record their learning, develop their theological reflections and to make notes of group discussion points.

Each EfM group operates under the authority of the Parish Priest, and has a least one recognized mentor who has undertaken training with EfM Australia. The Mandurah group is the only group currently operating in the Diocese of Bunbury. Around Australia there are both parish based groups that meet face to face, and online groups that meet via Zoom. Swedish Method of Bible Study

Here's an easy and effective way to study any Bible passage. You might like to give it a try either by yourself or in a small group. Have a pen and piece of paper or notebook handy.

1. Read a Bible passage - perhaps from one of the gospels.

2. Write down:

Light bulbs: Something that 'shines' from the text—whatever impacts you most or draws your attention. Things that really strike you as significant or new.

Question marks: Anything that is difficult to understand in the text, or a question you'd like to ask the author if you could.

Arrows: Anything that has a personal implication or application for your life or your convictions.

3. *If studying alone*, pray about your lightbulbs, questions and arrow points.

In a group setting, set aside some time to talk together about what you have read.

- Start by praying that God would help you to learn and grow together and encourage each other.
- Share the bits of text you each put a light bulb next to and explain to one another why.
- Next share your question marks. If you feel like you can answer each other's questions, do that. But if they are curly questions, maybe one or both of you can commit to doing some research and coming back to them at your next session.
- Finally, share your arrow applications, and pray together about those and the other things you have learned.

Optional:

You could print out copies of the Bible passages and draw the symbols of the lightbulbs, question marks and arrows next to the relevant places in the text. This is especially helpful for anyone who doesn't like to write too much.
