





DIOCESE OF BUNBURY – 2024 CURSILLO PILGRIMAGE

An idea was formed some time ago to undertake a pilgrimage of the Wheatbelt region of the Bunbury Diocese, to spend time in the company of faithful Christians, to meet together in fellowship and worship, celebrating the pioneers and stalwarts of our small communities. To pray and encourage the people, and discover some wonderful country in this great land.

During the week of Monday September 30 to Saturday October 5, this event took place. What a wonderful time to travel the Wheatbelt, with wildflowers coming into bloom and crops looking healthy.

Our theme song was "God give us a future" and we shared the Pilgrim's Prayer by Ninevah Murray. We had our own travelling musician, who used the local church organs as much as possible, or used a portable keyboard elsewhere.

Morning prayer, Holy Communion and Evening Prayer were held in churches, both still in regular use and those not currently hosting regular worship. All people, not just Cursillistas, were invited to join us at any time on the pilgrimage, responsible for their own travel, accommodation and meals. 13 people were fortunate to attend the full pilgrimage but others were able to join for 1,2, or up to 5 days. As a group, we were able to form connections with each other, and spent a couple of evenings together for a meal during the pilgrimage.

In the 6 days, we held services in 16 churches – starting at 10am in Williams, moving on to Quindanning, Marradong, Pingelly, Mourambine, Corrigin, Lake Grace, Lake Biddy, Hyden, Lake King, Ravensthorpe, Jerramungup, Gnowangerup, Broomehill, Badgebup, and finishing with a 10am service at Wagin.

The services were led by a mixture of Clergy and Lay, including local Clergy if they were available. We were fortunate to have Bishop Ian celebrate the Eucharist with us at Mourambine Church, and Archdeacon Geoff at Wagin Church. Some services were very well attended by locals, others not so, but at every stop we made an effort to understand the local issues, appreciate their struggles and celebrate their achievements.

It was a lovely week of encouragement and fellowship both for the pilgrims and for those we met throughout the pilgrimage.

Our theme sentence was from Jeremiah 29:11-12: "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you."
